Legislative Update –	Doug Gill reviewed the results of the 2016	Handout provided.		
Doug Gill	Legislative session with members, and			
	highlighted a variety of bills that passed the			
	Legislature with implications for students			
	with disabilities receiving services under the			

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	IDEA. Among the bills highlighted were SB			
	5879 which requires a full accounting of			
	services provided by school districts on behalf			
	of infants and toddlers aged 0-2; SSB 6466			
	which establishes a mechanism for			
	institutions of higher education to identify and			
	address barriers to students with disabilities			
	accessing and participating in higher			
	education opportunities, and SB 6194 which			
	supports charter schools by defining them as			
	"charter public schools" in response to the			
	Washington State Supreme Court decision in			
	September of 2016 that the charter schools			
	were "unconstitutional." SB 6194 establishes			
	an Opportunities Pathways Account to fund			
	charter public schools in 2016-17 rather than			
	funding the charter public schools through the			
	common school fund. Eight charter public			
	schools are expected to be operational in			
	Washington for the 2016-17 school year.			
Assistant	Doug Gill also updated SEAC members			
Superintendent's Update	regarding various state initiatives including			
	the Special Education Consistency Index			
	conceptualized with the help of SEAC in May			
	of 2014, and the implications for			
	reauthorization of No Child Left Behind Act			
	of 2001 with the Every Student Succeeds Act			
	(ESSA) of 2015 for students with disabilities			
	receiving IDEA services. More discussion of			
	the process for providing input and			
	recommendations to the statewide ESSA			
	Consolidated Plan team (which includes 3			
	SEAC members; Sarah Butcher, Sherry			
	Krainick, and Ann Waybright) was scheduled			
	for SEAC's Day 2 agenda.
