	 The Safety Net application process is now electronic instead of mailing a hard copy and removing the redaction process which saves a great deal of time. Increased the training for Safety Net. Districts may want to determine Extended School Year (ESY) needs following winter break, rather than spring break. Including High School and Beyond Plans (HSBP) in Safety Net IEP review. Use of Non-Public Agency (NPA), and concerns, will be in the annual Safety Net Survey Legislative report in December 2019. RCW requires to reduce a Safety Net award if the district decides not to use Medicaid services. This has not been implemented. But starting in 2019-20, districts must submit either evidence of Medicaid billing when it's appropriate or take a reduction in the districts award. If the districts can provide evidence that their reasons are valid for not utilizing Medicaid services, then they do not take a reduction.
