


Each student, family, and community possesses strengths and cultural knowledge that benefits their peers, educators, and schools.

Ensuring educational equity:

- Goes beyond equality; it requires education leaders to examine the ways current policies and practices result in disparate outcomes for our students of color, students living in poverty, students receiving special education and English Learner services, students who identify as LGBTQ+, and highly mobile student populations.
- Requires education leaders to develop an understanding of historical contexts; engage students, families, and community representatives as partners in decision-making; and actively dismantle systemic barriers, replacing them with policies and practices that ensure all students have access to the instruction and support they need to succeed in our schools.







Welcoming Newcomers and their Families

Newcomers – K-12 students born outside the U.S. have recently arrived to the country and are learning English.

- Language Access All parents have the right to information about their child's education in a language they understand.
- Develop an intake system
 - Collect student/family history
 - Prior Schooling
 - Native Language Proficiency







Developing a Welcoming School Culture

Newcomers: Promoting Success through Strengthening Practice (WIDA self-paced eWorkshop)



- Building relationships that create and maintain welcoming communities
- Challenging personal and systemic biases
- Creating an atmosphere and system of shared responsibility
- Incorporating and building on the rich resources that multilingual newcomers bring




Connectedness, Inclusion and Belonging

4 Grounding Statements

- School connectedness refers to "the extent to which students feel personally accepted, respected, included, and supported by others in the school social environment"

- An inclusive environment ensures access and unconditional belonging for every person – Cobb, Krownapple, Belonging Through A Culture of Dignity

- "Belonging means more than having just access, it means having a meaningful voice and the opportunity to participate in the design of political, social, and cultural structures." – John A. Powell, Othering and Belonging Institute
- "Fitting in is about assessing a situation and becoming who you need to be to be accepted. Belonging, on the other hand, doesn't require us to change who we are; it requires us to be who we are." Brene' Brown

Key Elements of a School-Wide Plan for Belonging

Student Voice & Agency

 Empower students to have a voice in decision-making processes within the school.

Inclusive Environment

 Foster an inclusive environment where diversity is celebrated, and all students feel respected and valued.

Supportive Staff

 Train teachers and staff to be supportive mentors and advocates for students.



Key Elements of a School-Wide Plan for Belonging

Promote Positive Relationships

 Create structures for students to build positive relationships with their peers, teachers, and other school staff.

Community Engagement

• **Engage** parents, guardians, and community members in school activities and events.

Celebration of Achievements

• Recognize & celebrate students' achievements, whether academic, extracurricular, or personal.



Key Elements of a School-Wide Plan for Belonging

Conflict Resolution & Restorative Practices

Teach students conflict
 resolution skills and
 implement restorative
 justice practices to address
 conflicts and disciplinary
 issues.

Wellness & Mental Health Support

 Provide access to wellness resources, mental health support services, and counseling for students who may be struggling emotionally or psychologically.





Supportive Structures for Building Connection

Orientation

Guiding Questions

- How are you going to build connection and belonging?
- What are the tenets of your community?
- How can you leverage older students on campus?

Ideas

- Link Crew, ASB, clubs and sports teams, student panel, peer mentoring
- Scavenger hunts, team building activities, straw tower build



Academic & Social Emotional Supports

Guiding Questions

- What supports are available to students?
- What is the process for students to access the supports?

Ideas

Academic help, counseling supports (advising & mental health), extracurricular information



Parent Engagement

Guiding Questions

- What activities will the parents participate in?
- What multi-lingual supports are available for parents?
- What supports are in place to help parents navigate school norms and procedures?

Ideas

- Translated materials, interpretation services
- Multi-lingual support, liaison, parent panel, parent buddy system



Peer & Adult Mentorship Programs

Guiding Questions

- What structures do we have that can support peer mentors?
- How do we recruit peer mentors?
- How often do mentors interact with mentees?
- What data do we use to help match mentors and mentees?

Ideas

Check & Connect, Link Crew, Adult champion



Transition Planning Process

Provide Early Preparation for High School Entry

- Eighth to ninth grade orientation
- Establish ongoing parent engagement
- Conduct summer activities
 - Data to consider: eighth grade semester 1 data, eighth grade semester 2 data, eighth grade qualitative data
 - **Guiding Questions**: What's in place? Are there opportunities?

Multi-Day Format

- Dates for maximum attendance
- Funding: How will you pay for it?
- Scope and sequence of activities
- Parent engagement
- Staffing
- Data gathering

Orientation & Summer Bridge Considerations: First Week of School Format

First Week of School Format

- Scope & sequence of activities
- Data gathering
- Modified schedule? Building-wide?
- No academics or a relationship building focus
- Use of student leaders

Orientation and Summer Bridge Considerations: Summer Bridge

Summer Bridge

- Student recruitment
- Staffing
- Funding
- Instructional
- Social emotional learning
- Data collection
- Progress monitoring

Quick Wins to Get Started

Create a plan for parent engagement




