# **Lesson: Our Story: Coming to America**

Activities include <u>Foods From Far Away</u>, <u>Imagine an Immigration Interview</u>, <u>Investigating Immigration Patterns</u>, and <u>Timelines Tell Stories</u>. Each activity includes directions, worksheets, and the same paired informational text ("Step Back in Time").
